~ Sponsorship ~

In my first few months of sobriety, I was into my 90 and 90 and joined a step study to begin my journey in sobriety. I was feeling the desolate darkness surround me. One cold evening, I went to a new meeting at a church near me. The meeting was in a corner of the church and dark. I was dark. I kept going to this meeting, and one night I saw an angel in the darkness. I was drawn to her and asked her if she would sponsor me. She began by explaining the rules. "How far are you willing to go to get sober?" she asked. I was petrified with fear. I did what she said. I was desperate.

Then she took me on the path guiding me through the 12 steps. We met faithfully. We met at meetings, in the car, in a corner of the church where there was now light. I look back and still feel God's presence with us every step of the way. He brought us together. Through her, he opened my heart to the sunlight of the spirit.

From the beginning, my sponsor told me her job was to teach me to be a sponsor. I scoffed. I could not imagine myself in her place. But, over time, working the program and living sober with my dearest friends who where there beside me, I realized I had to give what was so freely given me. For me the joy of sponsorship is God working through me. There is such joy in being honored to listen to someone's fifth step and to know that God answers when I don't know how.

A sponsor is someone that is there for you. They watch out for you and pray for you. They share their own honest experiences with you. They guide, encourage, discourage and show you the right thing to do. Sometimes they don't know the answers, but they will find them for you. Sponsors come from a long lineage and share what they have been given freely to all brothers and sisters in sobriety.

If you are new, look for a sponsor in every meeting. Listen and allow yourself to reach out. Ask someone to be your temporary sponsor to get started. For me, the sooner I found my sponsor, the sooner I was guided to the freedom of the promises through the 12 steps. The darkness is now gone.

Step 3

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood him.

I lived life in self-will for so many years and money and pretty women became my God. I always had a belief in God but never had a relationship with God. I remember making big money in the Fine Wine Industry, having pretty girlfriends and thinking I was a big shot. Meanwhile I was given the opportunity to raise my two daughters, ages 5 and 8 at the time and I totally ignored God's Gifts right in front of me! My selfishness caused so much wreckage. Through the help of sponsors and continuing to grow in recovery, I have come to the conclusion that I was truly living a

Spiritually Sick Life.

I met all of the pretty girlfriends through going to bars in a lonely state of mind. Sick attracts sick, healthy attracts healthy. The end results of these relationships were

girlfriends that lied cheated and stole from me and I was always the victim. I could never rely on these *spiritually sick* people; just as no one could rely on me in my *spiritually sick state of mind*. The crazy thing is that I was going to church every Sunday; I remember thinking: If these people only knew what I was doing last night, I hope they don't smell the Alcohol oozing out of my pours?

I finally hit my rock bottom on September 11th 2003, with my 2nd DUI on the 10th month of probation for my 1st DUI. I came too out of a blackout in a jail cell and said to myself: O Shit I did it again! Part of the my consequences to my actions was 2 months in county jail, I had never lived in jail before and it completely scared the hell out of me; I felt I was truly in living Hell! This

was the first time that I prayed to God for help and he did help me, he got me through jail without being raped, murdered or committing suicide. I had time in there to reflect on my life and realize that I was an Alcoholic. My father had 20 years in the program of Alcoholics when he passed in 2003 and I knew where to go for help and direction.

When I got out of jail I felt like God was giving me a second chance at life! I found a home group, went to meetings every day and got a great sponsor who walked me through the steps. My understanding of step 3 has changed today with more clarity from living life on life's terms in recovery and Trusting in God. I have come to the conclusion that I have to make a decision to

turn my will over to God every day! I say the Serenity prayer every morning and ask God for direction each day to do his will.

Making a daily effort to communicate to God has changed my point of view on life and I believe

trying to apply all of the steps in my life every day has made me healthier every day! The big promises in my life that I have received through this program are the great relationship that I have with my two daughters who are now 19 and 22 and the amassment of having a best friend / wife in my life! Healthy attracts healthy, my wife Kelly and I are celebrating being together 4 years this month and 2 years of Marriage next month! Some days life gets' s overwhelming and I am driven by 100 forms of fear! I have found that the solution is always the same, stop pray to God for help and direction, go to a meeting and help another person.

Concept 3: To insure effective leadership, we should endow each element of A.A. — the Conference, the General Service Board and its service corporations, staffs, committees, and executives — with a traditional "Right of Decision."





The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for A.A. membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions. A.A. is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution; does not wish to engage in any controversy; neither endorses nor opposes any causes. Our primary purpose is to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

Step 3:

Made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understood Him.

Tradition 3:

The only requirement for A. A. membership is a desire to stop drinking.

TRADITIONS CHECKLIST Tradition Three

- 1) In my mind, do I prejudge some new AA members as losers?
- 2) Is there some kind of alcoholic whom I privately do not want in my AA group?
- 3) Do I set myself up as a judge of whether a newcomer is sincere or phony?
- 4) Do I let language, religion (or lack of it), race, education, age, or other such things interfere with my carrying the message?
- 5) Am I over impressed by a celebrity? By a doctor, a clergyman, and ex-convict? Or can I just treat this new member simply and naturally as one more sick human, like the rest of us?
- 6) When someone turns up at AA needing information or help (even if he can't ask for it aloud), does it really matter to me what he does for a living? Where he lives? What his domestic arrangements are? Whether he had been to AA before? What his other problems are?





"THE ONLY REQUIREMENT FOR MEMBERSHIP IS A DESIRE TO STOP DRINKING" THIRD TRADTION ALCOHOLICS ANONYMOUS

I was asked to share my experience, strength and hope on our Third Tradition in Alcoholics Anonymous. The Traditions, born from our mistakes, were formulated in 1946, a little over 10 years after Bill W. and Dr. Bob met and participated in the first AA Meeting. I was taught early in AA, and I still firmly believe, the Traditions are to the group, what the Steps are to the individual member. If groups disregard the Traditions, the group can get sick and die. I have seen many groups that disregarded this suggestion, and many are not in operation today.

In the early days of AA, most groups had membership rules. They were so afraid of their fragile existence, they wanted "pure alcoholics." Many were turned away, and no doubt died as a result of the intolerance. In time and with more experience, AA groups became more confident that a Higher Power was in charge, and they became less afraid of newcomers who had a drinking problem, as well as perhaps a drug habit. As the Big Book of Alcoholics Anonymous states on page 161, "No one is too discredited or has sunk too low to be welcomed cordially-if he means business". The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions page 141, "at last experience taught us that to take away any alcoholic's full chance was sometimes to pronounce his death sentence, and often to condemn him to endless misery."

Even though the Third Tradition opens a wide door to all problem drinkers, in my own experience, folks who come to AA and do not have a drinking problem, and "a desire to stop drinking" are doing a disservice to themselves, the AA group, and the other 12 Step Program where they would find a more compatible fellowship. Also, it is the super ego of the group and the individual members if they attempt to be all things to all people. In Dr. Bob's later years he worried about the future of AA and gave us this advice, "shoemaker stick to your last." I agree, and I want to see AA, and its solution for the problem drinker, to be preserved for future generations. I will not work with a newcomer who does not have a problem with alcohol, if for no other reason, I might be doing more harm. There are over 100 other 12 step programs with solutions for other problems.

In closing, our experience, strength and hope with alcoholism, before and after discovering AA, is everything to the new problem drinker who will eventually hear his story, and identify as belonging to our fellowship. That, of course is our primary purpose, "to stay sober and help other alcoholics to achieve sobriety." Sobriety is defined as, "freedom from alcohol". Our Co-Founder Bill W. stated in a talk I listened to recently, "A non alcoholic can not be a member of AA because he can not carry out our primary purpose of carrying the message to the alcoholic who still suffers." As the 12 and 12 states on page on page 139, "the new person is a member of AA, if they say so".

That is good news for any hopeless alcoholic who has never fit in or found a solution to stop drinking. If you have a problem with alcohol and a desire to stop drinking, please rest assured you are most welcome in AA, no matter how far down the ladder you have traveled, and we have a way out upon which we can absolutely agree.

Local Tidbit

Colorado Springs AA Pioneers

In 1942, Colorado Springs was a town of 40,000 souls. Founded as a dry town by General Palmer, you could only buy alcohol with a prescription here back then. That didn't stop two of Colorado Springs AA Pioneers from struggling with their alcoholism, though.

In May, 1942, Dave Clark, a local publicist for the Alexander Film Company and sports writer for the Gazette-Telegraph, wrote an appeal to the Alcoholic Foundation in New York (now known as the A.A. General Service Office). Dave asked about organizing a chapter of A.A. in Colorado Springs, that he'd "...qualified for a rating as an alcoholic, but had been on the wagon more than a year. Will this make me eligible for membership?"

Happily, our 3rd Tradition states that "The only requirement for A.A. membership is a desire to stop drinking," which Dave certainly had! Even though our traditions were not published until the '50s, there is ample evidence that this specific wording was read aloud in the original meetings during the 40s.

Margaret 'Bobbie' Burger responded back to Dave's letter. Bobbie had just taken over for the original secretary, Ruth Hock, and spent the 40s developing correspondence with new A.A groups across the country. She had a warm and personal touch to her letters, quite literally the hand of A.A.. In 1945, she closed one letter to all known groups with, "I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the secretaries with whom I correspond for their splendid cooperation in keeping us up-to-date on local activities and for the very fine letters it is my privilege to receive. I know many of you so well although we have never met and I'm grateful for the many friendships this correspondence brings."

Bobbie was also a member of A.A.! She was 12-stepped by her sponsor, Marty M., in a mental hospital in New York. Marty used to say that Bobbie taught her a great lesson: you cannot predict who will recover and who won't. She initially thought Bobbie so far gone that she'd be a waste of time to sponsor, yet Bobbie got sober and became a critical part of A.A history.

Bobbie and Dave corresponded every year until 1945, when Mert Robbins took over as secretary for the first A.A. group in Colorado Springs. Dave wrote to Bobbie of Mert, "This Merton is a particularly likely member who will do much for the organization." Indeed, Mert held meetings in his clothing store at Tejon and Colorado Avenue (now the Thirsty Parrot); these meetings became known as Central Group, which still exists to this day (now at 309 S. Hancock, near Prospect Lake).

Had it not been for the 3rd Tradition, we don't know what might have become of Bobbie (possibly excluded for being a woman or mentally ill) or of Dave (possibly excluded for being dry a year by the time he started a group). In the February 1948 issue of the Grapevine, Bill Wilson writes, "Let us of A.A. resolve that we shall always be inclusive and never exclusive.. May all barriers be leveled, may our unity thus be preserved."




