# Approaching my 10-year slump

Sitting in a dark corner of my room I was wrestling with the emotions brought to the surface during the earlier meeting. It was a good meeting as most are but, this one left me reflecting on my life and the lives of those around me. I was feeling the whole gambit of emotion racing through my sober mind as I stumbled through the decades. Even after nine plus years of active sobriety I found myself in a slump unlike anything I have experienced before.

As I look back on my life I began to see a pattern. My late teens and 20s were full-throttle. I found myself with a few DUIs, in drunk tanks, a prison and towards the end, I had a wife and two children. How all this happened I'm not real sure, but as the end of my 20s drew closer, my wife somehow knew we were on a collision course with disaster.



Just as I crossed into my 30s we were licking our wounds after a raging three-day bender. Sitting at the dining room table watching our children play on the

#### **CONCEPT 5:**

- Throughout our structure, a traditional "Right of Appeal" ought to prevail, so that minority opinion will be heard and personal grievances receive careful consideration.
- Do we encourage the minority opinion, the "Right of Appeal", to be heard at our home group, district committee meetings, area assemblies and the Conference?
- What does our group accept as "substantial unanimity"?
- Has our group experienced the "tyranny of the majority" or the "tyranny of the minority"?
- Does our group understand the importance of all points of view being heard before a vote is taken?

#### **TRADITION 5:**

Each group has but one primary purpose
— to carry its message to the alcoholic
who still suffers.

#### **TRADITION 5 CHECKLIST:**

- 1. Do I ever cop out by saying, "I'm not a group, so this or that Tradition doesn't apply to me"?
- 2. Am I willing to explain firmly to a newcomer the limitations of AA help, even if he gets mad at me for not giving him a loan?
- 3. Have I today imposed on any AA member for a special favor or consideration simply because I am a fellow alcoholic?
- 4. Am I willing to twelfth-step the next newcomer without regard to who or what is in it for me?
- 5. Do I help my group in every way I can to fulfill our primary purpose?
- 6. Do I remember that AA old-timers, too, can be alcoholics who still suffer? Do I try both to help them and to learn from them?

living room floor she said something that shook me to the bone. She simply said "are we really going to raise our children like this?"

Somewhere around six weeks later I was in a treatment facility and began a journey of healing and enlightenment. This was October of 1988 and I stayed sober throughout my 30s.

## My first slump

As I approached my 40s, slowly creeping up on my 10-year milestone I found myself drifting away from the fellowship, away from meetings and effectively drying out. It took a little less than three years for me to go from sobriety to sodryity. I was in an uncomfortable place but I wasn't drinking.

Yet.

Somewhere in the middle of 1998 I came home from a rough day at work. I looked for something to cook, but what I found was an old friend that ultimately cooked me. I found a half pint of rum.

I never reached my 10-year mark and raced through my 40s chasing my favorite escape. More was never enough and I never ran out. This run took its toll on me. The vast majority of the damage I did to family, friends and myself was during this run of self-absorbed, self-righteous and self-centered indignation to all who surrounded me. By the time I got to my 50s, I was a wreck spiritually, mentally, and physically.

However, I still had my business, my wife and my house, so I couldn't be that bad, right?

Wrong!

Remember the treatment center I entered in 1988? Well, in June 2008 I visited with an old friend I met in that facility 20 years prior. He told me his story and watered the seed of recovery that remained in me for all these years. Roughly six months later the seed germinated and I found my way back to the rooms. By the grace of God and the fellowship of Alcoholics Anonymous I have managed to stay sober throughout my 50s.

Now I am 60 and again looking at a 10-year milestone. I have been through the Steps several times and have stayed active in service. I have a sponsor, I sponsor, I have a home group, I chair one of our meetings, and I help with meetings in a juvenile detention center. This is all good but why am I in this slump? Why are my emotional biorhythms running the rapids of turmoil?

Why are the tools in my spiritual toolbox seemingly ineffective? Why are my demons haunting me from the depths of my soul?

## Realign with God

I don't know the answers to any of these questions, but I know Who does. So in order for me to reinforce my spiritual connection, I have to get back to basics and revisit the roots of the program that has carried me this far.

The first thing I needed to do is realign myself with the God of my understanding. The only way I know how to do this is to do what I was taught in the beginning. By admitting I let things get out of hand, believing a Power greater than I could help and making a decision to let Him I again put pen to paper. I was taught that when I sit quiet,

asking for Divine guidance and listening for the answers, what leaks out of my pen is sometimes surprising. Dr. Bob and the boys in Akron used this process called the two-way prayer. It takes practice, but it always yields answers. Some of which I don't like but they **always** make sense.

## Get right with me

Next, I had to get right with me. I needed to revisit my resentments, defects and shortcomings. Already putting pen to paper, I was easily able to highlight issues and bring them to the surface. Talking with my sponsor and others I trust in the program I was able to defuse the impact of these issues and neutralize the subsequent emotions, I felt better.

Daily I ask for guidance to do His will so that I might help another in need. I ask for the shortcoming and defect of the day be removed. I look at who I may have harmed and seek to make it right and I start most every day with a morning meeting to help energize these goals.

As I improve my conscience contact with God, everyday gets just a little easier. I have the power to solve any issue or situation that I am faced with today, even a slump. What I went through this last week was very real, alarming and mildly disturbing. I could go on and on about what the problem was but, let it suffice to say it all boiled down to fear.

It hit hard because the characters in this are all family and close to the heart. The slump I experi-
