Tradition 6

An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

Tradition 6 Checklist:

- Why is it important that we not get involved in outside enterprises?
- Is it ever wise for a group to lease a small building or endorse an outside event?
- Are all of the officers and members of our local clubhouse familiar with "Guidelines on Clubs" which is available from GSO?
- Should the secretary of our group serve on the mayor's advisory committee on alcoholism?
- Our group's landlord is raising money to pay for a new roof on the building. Should the group make a contribution? What if the landlord specifically asks the group to make a contribution?

...how I found out I was an alcoholic...

My name is Mike and I am an alcoholic.

The story about how I found out I was an alcoholic would read like an experiment, if I had known at the time what was going on. I did not.

Suppose genetics made you an alcoholic, but you did not drink most of your life! I didn't for reasons having little to do with me.

My first wife was the youngest child of an alcoholic father who had already left the home when she was born. She was very afraid of alcohol, and we did not keep or use it in our home. She passed away for medical reasons after 18 years of marriage.

I remarried a year and a half later to a woman I met at a Colorado Springs Grief Workshop I attended. She already had 16 years of sobriety in AA. We only had alcohol around to entertain guests and business associates.

When I turned 53, I had a great idea to learn how to pair wine with different foods. My wife was enthusiastic about this idea, and would pay attention to what wines I liked, and stock me up with it.

I now know that alcoholism is progressive, and you don't even need to use alcohol for it to progress and worsen. I was a late stage alcoholic, without knowing it! When I would drink a glass of wine, it seemed very enjoyable, and I would finish the bottle of wine that night. I did this pretty regularly for seven years. As a subscriber to Food and Wine magazine, I saw an article one time about what to do with leftover wine. I asked my wife what leftover wine was, and who would have a problem with it. She looked at me funny!

I later learned that as a late stage alcoholic, I would drink too much on a given evening, but my body would metabolize it over night and I would wake up clear headed. People find it hard to believe that I have never had a hangover. Under the circumstances, that's not a good thing!

There came a point in those seven years of drinking that I realized there was something about my use of wine that was not what I thought it was. I went through our house to see how much of it we had on hand, and it was 26 cases! If I mention that in a meeting now, I point out that we entertained a lot of business people, so really, only 25 cases were mine! At the end of my drinking there was a point that the same amount of drinking no longer produced the effect that I had come to expect. I realized that if I kept chasing that effect, I would have to drink more. I decided then to stop.

I suddenly went dry. And as a plus, I thought the problems that were happening because of the alcohol use would go away, since I stopped drinking. Another experiment: they did not. In the last years of my drinking I had become very angry and isolated and that did not improve at all, even in six months of not drinking.

I had been regularly seeing an alcohol specialty therapist who told me at the beginning I was an alcohol abuser. After six months he told me that I needed to "sample" AA meetings, because I was an alcoholic. How many meetings do I need to "sample?", I asked. "Three," he said.

What I discovered in attending and listening to other people's stories was that I had forgotten how to think about other people rather than myself. I learned about the idea of doing service work, working with a sponsor, and doing the steps. With the steps themselves, I learned the power of looking back to take a hard look at how my drinking affected others, and the need to honestly make that right, to the best of my ability.

Eventually I was able to share what I had learned with other men newer to the program.

I simply have a life today of being involved with others in different roles, that I never would have dreamed about eight years ago.

Three meetings was not enough! Some 2500 meetings is not enough, either. I'll let you know when I figure out what the number is!

Archives Corner

From the Area Service Office Archives:

Since June is Founders' month, the Archives Committee is writing a sketch on the first Alcoholics Anonymous groups in Colorado Springs. The information comes from the Archives binder: "Colorado Springs Alcoholics Anonymous Timeline: 1942 to 1955." Any errors are the sole responsibility of the writer, Doug L.

It begins with Dave C., a Springs man who "had been on the wagon for a year," writing to the General Service Office (GSO) in May 1942, wondering if he qualified for "membership" and asking about organizing a chapter of AA in Colorado Springs. GSO wrote Dave encouraging him to start a group and that inquiries about AA would be referred to him. Nothing more was heard from Dave C. until January 1943 when he again wrote GSO asking for pamphlets and books. Dave C. announced that the first meeting of the Colorado Springs AA Group would be held during November 1943. There were to be five attendees at that first meeting. Then the first two members, Dave C. and Fred U., both moved out-of-state, and the first little AA group collapsed.

Fast forward to November 1944 when Dave C. was back in town again working for the Gazette Telegraph and corresponding with GSO. He started a new AA meeting (still named the Colorado Springs Group which became the Colorado Springs Central Group in December 1945) probably in early 1945 with Mert R., Doc R., and William H. The Group met in the building housing Mert's business. Mert R. was a driving force in early Springs AA when Dave C. stepped back from leadership. The Gazette had a long write-up (March 11, 1945) on this early group that met on Sundays with eighteen members.

Soon there were several groups at Pueblo, Canyon City, and the Springs. There were open and closed meetings. Dave C. started several groups in this area including Group #2 which held only open meetings. Group #2 didn't last. The original group held almost all closed meetings. Dave C. died sober in August 1946 at age 40. Mert R. went on in 1951 to become Colorado's (Area 10) delegate to the first General Service Conference.

This article is only a very short description of early AA in our area. I'd say that when the Colorado Springs Group restarted in late 1944 or early 1945, Springs AA never looked back!

Supporting A.A.'s services

While contributions cover each group's rent and other expenses, the Seventh Tradition is essential to all areas of A.A. service. It is both a privilege and a responsibility for groups and members to ensure that not only their group, but also their intergroup/central office, local services, district, area, and the General Service Office remain self-supporting. The General Service Conference suggests that individual groups, through an informed group conscience, adopt a specific contribution plan tailored to meet the group's financial situation. Once the group's expenses have been taken care of the group may decide to further carry the message by sending money to the following A.A. service entities.

- The local district, which communicates directly with the groups, providing the district group conscience for the area assemblies, and serving as a link between the area delegates and the G.S.R.s.
- The area committee, which coordinates vital A.A. activities over a broad geographic area; sends a delegate to the annual General Service Conference; holds area assemblies to determine the needs of the Fellowship; and provides information at all levels of service.
- The local intergroup or central office, which may provide phone service for Twelfth Step calls and other inquiries; coordinates group activities; and facilitates A.A. literature sales, institutions work, public information, and cooperation with the professional community activities.
- A.A.'s General Service Office, which functions as a storehouse of A.A. information, communicating with members
 and groups around the world; publishes A.A.'s literature; and supplies information and experience to professionals
 and others interested


