
# **AREA SERVICE OFFICE (ASO)**

## **CONTRIBUTIONS BY MEMBERS:**

Time: How I viewed it then (experience)

Time was something I always thought I had plenty of. I always had time to do what I wanted...work, play, make love, go fishing, go to concerts, look for work \*I was looking for a job when I found this one\*, but eventually I mostly had time for one thing.... drinking. I'd quit for some appointment or function I had to be sober for but couldn't what for the time to be over, so I had more time to drink. Then time started running out. I had progressed in age and drinking. Time became my enemy. Never enough time to accomplish anything worthwhile. In my career, my marriage, fatherhood, manhood all the things I measured my life by. Time as a measurement ceased when I drank. The only time there was, was to have another drink.

• Time: How I view it today (strength)

Time for me today is precious. I get up early to pray, not well, but pray anyway. God doesn't care how I show up just show up and give Him time. I give Him time throughout the day. I take time to talk to my wife, ask how's she doing, what's she feeling. I ask my boss the same thing. I take time to ask others about themselves. I try to see their time as valuable not just mine. It is a work in progress every day because I'm selfish about my time no matter what time it is.

Time: Long term (hope)

Time is a commodity I can't buy. It can only be used. How I use time determines the success of my recovery. I use time trying to do the next right thing, which gives me a chance of staying sober today. I can use time to call my sponsor or talk to my trusted friends for guidance. I can then use time to build on a tomorrow that is never guaranteed. But I have a chance of being sober by using my time wisely today.

## AND FROM ANOTHER MEMBER:

#### Some things I have learned in AA

- 1. Letting go of old ideas is more difficult than one thinks but the results are worth the work.
- 2. Resentments and fear are one and the same.
- 3. Forgiveness for self and others is the foundation of emotional freedom.
- 4. Humility allows one to forgive and become part of the whole.
- 5. Humility is honesty spelled differently.
- 6. Anger is really just fear directed at others and is a part of life, it just doesn't have to direct life.
- 7. That I am the person I was born to be but was hidden periodically in the box built by not knowing the above.
- 8. That no one does this thing alone.
- 9. Asking for help and following directions is a sign of wisdom and strength.
- 10. Surrender allows all of this.
- 11. Never pass up a good opportunity to keep your mouth shut.
- 12. And, finally, that learning how to accomplish all of that is a life long labor of love.

## **TRADITION 12:**

Anonymity is the spiritual foundation of all our Traditions, ever reminding us to place principles before personalities.

## **CONCEPT 12:**

The conference shall observe the spirit of AA tradition, taking care that it never becomes the seat of perilous wealth or power; that sufficient operating funds and reserve be its prudent financial principle; that it place none of its members in a position of unqualified authority over others; that it reach all important decisions by discussion, vote, and whenever possible, substantial unanimity; that its actions never be personally punitive nor an incitement to public controversy; that it never perform acts of government; that, like the Society it serves, it will always remain democratic in thought and action.

#### **TRADITION 12 CHECKLIST:**

- Why is it a good idea for me to place the common welfare of all AA members before individual welfare? What would happen to me if AA as a whole disappeared?
- When I do not trust AA's current servants, who do I wish had the authority to straighten them out?
- In my opinions of and remarks about other AAs, am I implying membership requirements other than a desire to stay sober?
- Do I ever try to get a certain AA group to conform to my standards, not its own?
- Have I a personal responsibility in helping an AA group fulfill its primary purpose? What is my part?
- Does my personal behavior reflect the sixth tradition—or belie it?
- Do I do all I can do to support AA financially? When is the last time I anonymously gave away a Grapevine subscription?
- Do I complain about certain AA's behavior—especially if they are paid to work for AA? Who made ME so smart?
- ♦ Do I fulfill AA responsibilities in such a way as to please privately even my own conscience? Really?
- ♦ Do my utterances always reflect the Tenth Tradition or do I give AA critics real ammunition?
- Should I keep my AA membership a secret, or reveal it in a private conversation when that may help another alcoholic (and therefore me)? Is my brand of AA so attractive that other drunks want it?
- What is the real importance of me among more than a million AAs?

## From the Area Service Office (ASO) Archives:

Box 459 has been published quarterly since Fall 1969. Before that it was published monthly with special conference issues. Since December is the holiday season, I thought I'd write about the "good old days" and the Box 459 Holiday issue "Twelve Tips On Keeping Your Holidays Sober and Joyous." Thanks to Mark L. of the High Noon Group for remembering Victor E.'s name when I drew a blank. Any mistakes in this article are the responsibility of the author, Doug L.

For years, one of the last pages of the Winter issue – the "Holiday Issue" contained a page with twelve tips on keeping the holidays sober. Please see the following page for these twelve tips. The first issue I found with these tips was the Holiday Issue 1975. This 1975 write-up was not as elaborate as later "Tips." The first issue with a full-page "Tips" was Winter 1981. As usual with GSO and *Grapevine* stories, Victor E., the man with the fedora and a smile, made his appearance in the cartoons. Can you spot Victor E. in some of the twelve drawings? The last issue containing these tips was the Winter 2016 issue – the Holiday Issue. The Winter 2017 issue was still titled the Holiday Issue, but the twelve tips page was gone. Since 2018, the Winter issue is just that, the Winter issue. The Holiday Issue title was dropped.

I researched these dates at <a href="https://www.aa.org/box-459">https://www.aa.org/box-459</a>. Many Box 459 issues all the way back until May 1956 are available at the above URL. The ASO Archives has examples of hardcopy Box 459s, but nothing like the GSO hoard.

Keep your A.A. telephone list with you all the time. If a drinking urge or panic comes—postpone everything else until you've called an A.A.



Find out about the special holiday parties, meetings, or other celebrations given by groups in your area, and go. If 9 you're timid, take someone newer than you are.



Skip any drinking occasion you are nervous about. Remember how clever you were at excuses when drinking? Now put the talent to good use. No oflice party is as important as saving your life.



If you have to go to a drinking party and can't take an A.A. with you, keep some candy handy.



Don't think you have to stay late. Plan in advance an "important date" you have to keep.



Worship in your own way.



Don't sit around brooding. Catch up on those books, museums, walks, and letters.



Don't start now getting worked up about all those holiday temptations. Remember—"one day at a time."



Enjoy the true beauty of holiday love and joy. Maybe you cannot give material gifts—but this year, you can give love.



"Having had a . . ." No need to spell out the Twelfth Step here, since you already know it.

# Supporting A.A.'s services

While contributions cover each group's rent and other expenses, the Seventh Tradition is essential to all areas of A.A. service. It is both a privilege and a responsibility for groups and members to ensure that not only their group, but also their intergroup/central office, local services, district, area, and the General Service Office remain self-supporting. The

General Service Conference suggests that individual groups, through an informed group conscience, adopt a specific contribution plan tailored to meet the group's financial situation. Once the group's expenses have been taken care of the group may decide to further carry the message by sending money to the following A.A. service entities:

- The local district, which communicates directly with the groups, providing the district group conscience for the area assemblies, and serving as a link between the area delegates and the G.S.R.s.
- The area committee, which coordinates vital A.A. activities over a broad geographic area; sends a delegate to the annual General Service Conference; holds area assemblies to determine the needs of the Fellowship; and provides information at all levels of service.
- The local intergroup or central office, which may provide phone service for Twelfth Step calls and other inquiries; coordinates group activities; and facilitates A.A. literature sales, institutions work, public information, and cooperation with the professional community activities.
- A.A.'s General Service Office, which functions as a storehouse of A.A.
  information, communicating with members and groups around the world;
  publishes A.A.'s literature; and supplies information and experience to
  professionals and others interested.
